

Timeline Instructions

You can work alone or in groups of absolutely no more than three.

You complete your timeline on the large sheet of paper provided by your teacher.

As you build your timeline, it is suggested to use sticky notes until you're sure you're ready to draw or otherwise permanently add something to the paper.

You will store your work in the classroom. You do not have to take it home.

What should we put on the timeline?

Your timeline should include:

- brief character notes
- descriptions of main events and plot points for the scenes and acts
- any drawings or illustrations you wish to add
- memorable quotes

You will work on the timeline and add to it during the entire quarter or as long as we're reading the play.

How will we be graded?

Roughly every two weeks, your instructor will score your timeline according to the simple rubric below. Your timeline will also be judged by other classes, and the winner will get a special prize, yet to be determined.

Why are we doing this?

This will help you organize your thoughts about the play and it will also help you when it comes time to work on your character journal entries and your play notes.
